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GMS Leaders' Joint Summit Declaration

"A sustainable GMS will be regionally integrated and globally connected."

- GMS Leaders recognized the achievements of the GMS Program in its first
 25 years
- GMS Leaders adopted the <u>Ha Noi Action Plan</u> and <u>Regional Investment</u>
 <u>Framework</u> to guide the medium directions and project pipeline of the
 GMS Program for 2018-2022
- Leaders directed the GMS Ministers and Senior Officials to begin considering the long term vision for the GMS beyond 2022
- Leaders affirmed commitment to the Sustainable Development Goals and Paris Agreement on Climate Change
- Leaders encouraged greater cooperation for trade promotion activities, including acceleration of development of economic corridors and cross-border trade infrastructure, and improving trade-management capacity.





Advances in Connectivity- Economic Corridors




Expanded GMS Economic Corridor Network




- ➤ Proposed initiative on urbanization and smart cities: emphasizes economic corridor development, spatial planning, and cross-border special economic zones in key potential corridors and border cities of the GMS through urban infrastructure development, technical systems for urban management, modern infrastructure links for both soft and hard, connectivity via the Internet of things, and state-of-the-art digital systems (*Prime Minister Hun Sen, Cambodia, 6th Summit Retreat*)
- Support for the establishment of cross-border special economic zones, and urban development along economic corridors (*Prime Minister Nguyen Xuan Phuc, Viet Nam, 6th Summit Plenary*)
- ➤ GMS member countries link their special economic zones to open the way for our sub-region to become part of the ASEAN, Asian, and global value chains, based on the "3Ms" principle of Mutual Trust, Mutual Respect, and Mutual Benefit (Prime Minister Prayut Chan-o-cha, Thailand, 6th Summit Plenary)



- includes the status report in the documentation for a subsequent GMS event—senior officials meeting, ministerial meeting, or summit.

- RIF progress report is revised to annual report.
- GMS national coordinators play a key role in collaboration with line ministries and in projected investment pipelines.
- RIF 2022 report discussions are to better align with GMS working groups and forums.
- Final RIF 2022 reports are to be disseminated as reference for development and budget planning cycles.


