Rationale for GMS-2030

The GMS Program needs to reposition itself to ensure long-term sustainable growth and provide a collaborative effective response to 7 powerful global trends impacting GMS countries:

- 1. Weaker global growth and threats to free trade
- 2. Disruptive technological change
- 3. Evolving demographics
- 4. Rapid urbanization
- 5. Environmental and climate-change threats and pollution, including maritime plastics
- 6. Rising inequality and pockets of poverty
- 7. Global and regional pandemics threats



Innovative – Cross-Cutting Approaches

GMS 2030 features the following cross-cutting, innovative approaches

- i. An enhanced spatial approach to development:
 - a. Integrated network of economic corridors
 - b. Border areas
 - c. City clusters
- ii. A deeper dialogue on policies and regulation, underpinned by knowledgebased solutions and capacity-building
- iii. Embracing private sector solutions
- iv. Reaping the gains of digitalization
- v. GMS program as an open platform
 - a. Internally with local governments, academia, private sector, and civil society
 - b. Externally with other regional entities and development partners
- vi. A results framework

Institutional Enhancements

- Existing institutional mechanisms will remain lean, but will be strengthened
- ☐ New sector working groups for critical areas trade and investment facilitation
- Setting up more sector secretariats (RPCC) and sector ministerial-level meetings
- Establishing GMS Knowledge Centers and Think Tanks (Mekong Institute)
- GMS Program secretariat to deepen its traditional support role
- Strengthen:
 - GMS Local Government Forum
 - GMS Business Council
- Setting up new task forces, forums, networks to respond to new demands


GMS Cities Close to Rivers or Coast

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

GMS Regional Investment Framework 2022

Q1

The Asian Development Bank (ADB) Greater Mekong Subregion (GMS) secretariat initiates report preparation by advising ADB sector divisions and GMS national coordinators to communicate with country sector agency focal points.

The Regional Investment Framework (RIF) publication is disseminated for use and reference during the budget and development programming cycle.

O2-O3

ADB's sector divisions interact with country sector agency focal points through GMS working groups and forums to

- · receive and compile the completed and agreed sector reports, and
- · submit the sector reports to the ADB GMS secretariat for collation.

GMS national coordinators collaborate with line ministries for progress and proposed projects.

- RIF progress report is revised to become the annual report.
- GMS national coordinators play a key role in collaborating with line ministries and in project investment pipelines.

RIF 2022 report discussions are to better align with GMS working groups and forums.

 Final RIF 2022 reports are to be disseminated as reference for development and budget planning cycles.

Summary

- GMS Strategy 2030 has a renewed focus on a spatial approach to development (economic corridors, city clusters, border areas)
- GMS 2030 will focus on livable cities and development of cities and urban areas that border water bodies (ocean/coastal as well as lakes/rivers)
- The GMS RIF 2022 is a tool to prioritize the GMS medium-term project pipeline and mobilize financing,
 - but project proposals must be in line with regional and national strategies,
 - and project proposals must be coordinated between GMS working groups, line ministries, GMS national coordinators, and Ministries of Finance
