Maybe its standardised regulation of medicines and therapeutic products through the GMS? Is it improving air quality?

Or is it reducing the risks posed by microplastics and micropollutants?

Perhaps manufacturing motorcycle helmets for improved safety?

Transport

This area of cooperation was one of the first for the GMS. The Subregional Transport Forum (STF) has its fourth strategy—GMS Transport Sector Strategy 2030

Tourism

Work of the GMS tourism working group has included marketing sustainable and pro-poor tourism in the subregion through a range of initiatives including improving border facilities and management.

Environment

Forests, wetlands, mangroves, farmlands, and other ecosystems account for between 20% and 55% of the subregion's wealth. Better planning and management are needed to avoid food shortages, price shocks, health hazards, and environmental damage.

Agriculture

Agriculture is the backbone of the GMS economies. The GMS agriculture ministers expressed a joint vision of promoting the GMS as a leading supplier of safe, quality and climate-friendly agri-food products.

Urban Development

This is a newer area of cooperation which oversees urban development –modern

	environmental services and infrastructure (e.g., water, wastewater, and solid waste management) all contribute to health impacts.
