

The 2030 Agenda provides a key opportunity to proactively address migration and its relationship to development.



The inclusion of migration in the SDGs has two important precedents for migration governance:

Enables greater collaboration between different countries on migration

Goal 8: Promote sustained, inclusive and sustainable economic growth, full and productive employment and decent work for all.

Improve all migrant groups' financial inclusion by expanding access to banking, insurance and financial services

B DECENT WORK AND ECONOMIC GROWTH



Protect labour rights for migrant workers who are often at greater risk of exploitation, violence and/or abuse, especially female migrant workers in domestic employment

Support skills development, recognition and matching, including through bilateral labour migration agreements to meet market needs

Ensure the fair and ethical recruitment of migrant workers

Leveraging the GCM to support the 2030 Agenda

Rooted in the 2030 Agenda (10.7), the GCM presents a roadmap to facilitate safe, orderly and regular migration.

The GCM recognizes that when properly managed, migration contributes to positive development outcomes.

The GCM provides a robust framework to support the achievement of the migration dimensions of the SDGs.

As Coordinator of the UN Network on Migration, IOM is leveraging the GCM to accelerate action on the 2030 Agenda.







COVID-19 has highlighted the importance of well governed migration for prosperous and healthy societies.


We are reliant –

"The best way to recognize the important contribution made by people on the move to our societies during this crisis is to remove barriers that inhibit their full potential. This means facilitating the recognition and accreditation of their qualifications, exploring various models of regularisation pathways for migrants in irregular situations and reducing transaction costs for remittances."

Pressing Policy Interventions



are leveraged fairly and equitably to

Migrants, regardless of status, must have equitable access to quality health services.

Facilitate labour mobility of health workers to mitigate labour

Building on technological advances, foster virtual student mobility to counter physical restrictions for continued global advancement of research and knowledge sharing.

Invest in skilling and re-skilling of migrants and returnees to increase their access to decent work.

> Ensure that migrant men and women, regardless of migratory status, are included in efforts to combat increaseing gender-based violence and socio-economic vulnerability due to COVID-19.

Address the COVID-19-specific vulnerability of migrants regarding their sexual and reproductive health.
