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1. GMS Economic Cooperation Program Strategic Framework 2030 (GMS 2030)


Approved by GMS Leaders at the 7th GMS Summit, 9 September 2021, hosted by Cambodia


□Long Term: holistic approach

4. GMS Results Framework

Rationale, Mandate and Process

One of these innovative approaches of **GMS-2030** is enhanced monitoring and evaluation through the development of a Results Framework (RF) for the strategic framework.

The **Independent Evaluation Department of ADB** recently identified the lack of strong monitoring and evaluation mechanisms in past GMS strategic frameworks as one of the weaknesses of the GMS Program and recommended for the development of a comprehensive results framework for GMS-2030.

Measuring the strategic objectives helps to determine if the GMS Program is delivering GMS-2030 effectively, and if this not the case, sets the context for adjusting the program.

Process started in January 2022 and it will **involve reaching out to sectors on indicators**; GMS Results Framework to be endorsed at GMS Ministerial Conference Q3-Q4 2022



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GMS Results Framework Three-Level Approach and Methodology

Level 1 Indicators: Progress of the GMS subregion towards attaining the vision

- Macro-level indicators reflect the outcomes resulting from multiple factors at the national, subregional and global levels.
- Outcomes are not directly attributable to the GMS Program but rather result of aggregate and cumulative efforts that influence the subregion's development efforts.

Level 2 Indicators: Results of RCI initiatives under the three pillars of GMS 2030

- Measures the outcomes and outputs of GMS initiatives under the three pillars of GMS-2030

 connectivity, competitiveness and community.
- The grouping of sectors under the three pillars of GMS-2030 was used to organize the outcome, outputs and indicators.
- · Another layer on cross-cutting areas was added to the three pillars.

Level 3 Indicators: Financial and institutional support to the GMS Program

- Tracks the financing, knowledge-management and institutional arrangements of the GMS Program. These indicators will focus on inputs in supporting the outputs in Level 2.
- This level will also specify the dimensions of ADB's performance and contributions and help clarify its value-addition to the GMS Program.



5. GMS Urban Development Strategic Framework

- 1. The GMS Urban Development Strategic Framework 2016-2022 is coming to an end and a new strategic/planning document for the sector is to be developed during 2022.
- 2. This activity is to be undertaken is to be **led the Urban Development Working Group** with close support from the GMS Secretariat.
- The new strategic/planning document will need to help achieve the objectives under GMS-2030 and be relevant for the changing needs of the subregion.
- 4. The new strategic/planning document will need to be **demand driven, implementable and monitorable**.
- 5. A first immediate step to help reach clarity on the new strategic/planning document, it is proposed to **conduct a rapid assessment of the current strategic framework**, namely: (i) achievement of its purpose and objectives (ii) relevance for GMS countries in the sector (iii) adequacy of institutional arrangements (e.g. Working Group).
